6. Course Description:

A) Objectives:

This course explores the rich and formative period of Western philosophy, tracing its origin and evolution. It begins by considering how philosophy emerged from and contended with myths and poetry, while also intertwining with natural sciences in its early stages. The course investigates the profound questions posed by the Greeks that remain relevant today: Why is there something rather than nothing? What is the origin of existence? Can we identify the building blocks of reality? Can nature guide us in living a meaningful life? What constitutes a good life? What is the ideal form of government? Is poetry inherently irrational? Students will engage in a contemporary and critical dialogue with the Pre-Socratics, Sophists, Socrates, Plato, and Aristotle. The course discusses the interplay between inquiries into the natural world and the social-cultural realm, demonstrating how these domains influence one another. The course shows how a philosophical conversation with ancient thinkers can be intellectually enriching and transformative.
